
• Christian Cepeda – School Parking Lot Concerns

"I just wanted to follow up on the speed bump recommendations as discussed in the previous meeting. I'm making suggestions as to their placement for review by John and council. "

- Speed bump location analysis
- Too many parents speed through the parking lot with many kindergarten kids crossing while not paying attention
- There is no industry standard how far apart bumps have to be placed
- This could apply to both lots with calculation being slightly different
- Not certain on cost; could have permanent speed bumps (concrete) or bolted down ones (rubber)
- P/VP stated received very few complaints about speeding; parent concerns and complaints were mostly about congestion
- Safety committee should put together recommendations and the Board Facilities
 Supervisor will decide one whether to install speed bumps, where to add them
 and what kind
- o Mr. Susi will pass this on and will let us know in the new school year
- Some people stop in the lot causing a jam and no one can get by
- Could we add a sign near the current portables advising that stopping here is prohibited?
- People also park right in the entrance/exit driveway
- All schools seem to face the same issues.
- It is imperative that we exercise Patience, Caution & Respect while driving in the parking lot
- We should organize a week long awareness campaign, hand out fliers, etc....
- Good time for this would will be at the beginning of the year
- o This should be organized by the safety committee Christian C. and Kelechi A.
- The safety committee will make their safety improvement recommendations to be forwarded to the HCDSB Facilities supervisor (as was done in 2014-15 with last year's safety committee)
- We should also see what other schools have done in regards to speed bumps
- We should also highlight the end of 'kiss &ride' lane more
- Perhaps we should add crossing lines

Speed Bump Location Analysis - Queen of Heaven—South Parking Lot

Distance Estimations



- Speed bumps lower vehicle speed to 8 k/h*
- No agreed industry standard.*
- Appropriate when speed limit is less than 50 k/h*

*Bahar, et al. Updated Guidelines for the Design and Application of Speed Humps.

Velocity and Distance Analysis

- The average acceleration of common cars ranges from 3 mps to 4mps (Barricella, 2001).
- o Distances for consideration 100 m and 105 m.
- Assumptions made
 - Left curve will compensate for 5 m difference to simply calculations.
 - Initial velocity after speed bump is 5kmp (1.38 mps)* (see reference)
- Average final velocities can reach 101.8 kph

Calculations...

d=100m, a=4m/s2, Vi=1.38m/s

$$V_f^2 = V_i^2 + 2ad$$

= (1.38m/s)² + 2(4m/s²)(100m)
= $V(801.9m^2/s^2)$
= 28.3m/s OR 101.8kph

Cars can POTENTIALLY reach a maximum velocity of 101.8 kph!!

Option 1: Placing 2 speed bumps along either side

- Divides distance into 3 sections.
- o Reduces potential velocity to 5kmp after each bump.
- Maximum theoretical velocity is 57 kph
- Maximum real velocity would be approximately 40 kph (assuming 15 m stopping distance)

Option 2: Placing 3 speed bumps along either side

- Divides distance in 4
- Maximum theoretical velocity is 50.4kph
- Maximum real velocity (assuming 15 m stopping distance) is 32.4 kph

Considerations

- Obtrusive nature of speed bumps
- Clearance for snow removal
- Cost
- Safety
- Visual distraction
- o Reason for speeding—management?

Summary


Option 1 (2 speed bumps/side): 40 kph Option 2 (3 speed bumps/side): 32 kph

Placement:

Option 1: 33 m from street, then 66 m from street. 33 metres from side walk on north end, then 66 m from side walk.

Option 2: 25 m from street, then 50 metres from street and another at 75 metres from street. 25 metres from sidewalk on north end, 50 metres from side walk and 75 metres from side walk.

Christian Cepeda – School Phone Communication Protocol

How are phone voice messages handled?

What is the best way to contact the school in case of emergency?

- We have a procedure in place to call in an absence but do we also have one to advise that someone else is picking up the student or that the student is being picked up at a later time?
- There have been instances where the information called in has not gotten to the correct person or was relayed inaccurately
- Office staff checks messages on a regular basis and there is always a person in the office even when the phone does not get answered. If the voice mail picks up, then it could mean that all three lines are in use, or the secretary is by herself in the office and then leaves the front desk to tend to first aid.
- We only have 3 phone lines in the school regardless of actual phones; this is considered the maximum for our size
- Consider that various staff members are also using the phone lines but be assured that messages get checked promptly and regularly
- Next year, as we grow over to over 800 students, we will have another part time office assistant

- One suggestion would be to call in earlier as the phone lines get extremely busy around 2:30pm with parents calling in advising of different pick up time/person
- Mr. Susi says it is best, when possible, to write a note in the student's agenda for the teacher.

7. School Uniforms – John Susi

From Kim Male - follow up from last meeting; possible additions/changes to our current uniform selection. Parents will need to vote on changes that may be <u>implemented for</u> September 2017.

- We are able to change some of the choices that we currently have for tops as per board policy
- It is within our authority for school council to make a decision on those choices
- McCarthy has to be notified one year in advance in order to implement a change
- We could add a hoody but therefore must eliminate another similar top (e.g. ¼ zip)
- We could add a vest but is not considered a popular item; schools usually go with a cardigan instead
- We are unable to add a green shirt; we can only offer blue or white for elementary schools as per board policy
- We are also unable to offer a rugby shirt as the price point is simply too high for elementary schools. This is an option for high school only.
- We could however pick a supportive colour for a cardigan or a vest
- A cardigan or a vest could be in addition to the existing uniform items, nothing else needs to be eliminated
- A hoody without a zipper does not usually sell well (as per the McCarthy rep's report)
- If we choose to add a full zip with hoody, we have to eliminate either the existing full zip without hood or the ¼ zip sweater
- Samples of all items were presented
- Not certain about price difference, but items should be rather close in cost
- We are able to make changes every year should people not be happy with the decision we made
- Vote do we want the hoody? Majority votes YES!
- Vote How many would like to have the hoody & the existing full zip jacket?

Show of hands: 6

How many would like to have the hoody & the existing 1/4 zip sweater?

Show of hands: 7

Majority vote for hoody & 1/4 zip, eliminating full zip jacket with no hood

• Do we want to add a cardigan (made of 55% cotton & 45% polyester)?

- Do we want to encourage purchasing something that kids may not want to wear?
- If we do not have a cardigan and we take away the full zip jacket without the hood, we have no formal clothing left
- Vote Majority wants to add cardigan; nothing will be taken out for that
- Do we want the cardigan in blue or green (not our Kelly green, more of a forest green)?
- Vote − Majority would like navy blue cardigan (navy − 10, green − 1)
- It is the board policy that it has to be the uniform golf shirt and no turtle neck under the sweater/cardigan, etc.
- It is also a policy that Halton schools have individual emblems rather than all sharing the same
- CPEC Member (Mark) advised that they are done for this year but the topic on whether one emblem would be accepted for all Halton schools could be discussed in September
- There are also yoga pants available for girls
- There will also be a new design introduced for skorts that will however not be available before Jun 30/16 and therefore will not qualify for the discounted price
- Old uniform items could be donated to the school even if you are not interested in an exchange
- Sweat pants are allowed for gym class; uniform clothing is not mandatory for gym
- Can students wear different coloured socks? No, only white or blue is permitted as per board policy
- Sandals are okay without socks; there is no uniform for footwear
- McCarthy's Milton outlet opens only in July
- Patched uniform pants are okay or one could cut off part of the pant leg to turn them into shorts (same length as the skorts or shorts)
- Shorts are unisex
- We have seen very few uniform infractions
