Catholicity	 Once again, we will have a school-wide focus on our Ontario Catholic Graduate Expectations. Each 5-7 weeks we will focus on one of the expectations. Currently, we are focused on what it means to be a Responsible Citizen. Teachers have had lessons on responsible citizenship and developed age-appropriate criteria with their students. This award will be given out during our Thanksgiving Liturgy We had our opening school mass during our second week at school. This went very well, the responses are now up on screens and greatly improved student participation in the service. We had many parents turn out, for which we were extremely grateful. Debbie Frey is the new Youth Minister, and she has already begun working closely with our staff and students. She plans on having special "Teaching Masses" for the students at the church. Since she has come, attendance at the Conquest and Challenge program as trebled. Grade 7 students will be having a special Twilight Retreat at the church. Faith Day for our staff will be on Friday, October 5th, there will be no school for students on that day.
Curriculum	Curriculum Night – We had our Curriculum Night on Wednesday, September 19th. There was an excellent turnout. Attitudinal Data • 97 % of Gr 3 and 100 % of Gr 6 report that they like to read some for most of the time • 100% of Gr 3 and 93% of Gr 6 report that they like doing math some or most of the time • School Improvement • As part of our focus on school improvement, we are working together as a staff to support Critical Thinking in the classroom. Towards this end, staff are

reading *Creating Thinking Classrooms* by Garfield Gini-Newman. This is in an effort to support the needs of the 21st Century learning, including helping our learners to develop the skills that will be necessary in the workplace in the 21st Century.

- Changes to the Intermediate Rotary schedule and the recess times for Intermediate students. Science, Geography, History, Physical Education, will each have an 80-minute class and a 40 min. class per week. This is to allow a longer period one day per week to work on project-based learning, student inquiry, collaboration, and Science experiments. Combined recesses allow for a longer period at the end of the day, increased supervision, and fewer transitions in the hallways.
- This year we will be having a school Science Fair organized by Mrs. Thompson. **Reading Intervention**
 - Reading intervention continues for our Primary students this year with Mrs.
 Chiarotto using the Leveled Literacy Intervention (LLI) program. In addition to this, we also have 25 Lexia licenses for students reading significantly below grade level.
 - Big Brother/Big Sisters Homework Club will be beginning this month
 - Progress Reports will be going home in November, and Interviews will take place on November 22nd and 23rd.

• Three staff members are going to Brock University on October 9th to learn about STEM activities in the classroom.

Culture and Community

- Breakfast Program begins next Tuesday. We are very thankful to our Knights of Columbus and parent volunteers who make this wonderful program possible.
- The Great Big Crunch, sponsored by Halton Food for Thought, will launch our first Healthy Snack Day on October 25th.
- Treat lunches begin again on October 12th. Once again, we are very grateful to the wonderful parent volunteers who make these treat lunches possible.
- BRAVO program is beginning the week after Thanksgiving. Last year, Officer Scott was on a leave, so the program did not run. This year, we have a new Liaison Officer, Constable Dawn Freeland, who has agreed to work with both our Grade 6 and our Grade 7 students on Monday and Tuesday afternoons.
- Our Cross-Country teams have been practicing for their competition at Kelso Conservation. This year the Grades 4-8 will be running on October 17th.
- Our Senior Girls' and Boys' Volleyball season is well under way. All of their games are posted on our School Calendar on our website.
- Mr. Boulos, Mrs. Kotulak, and Mrs. Boulos cleaned and painted the trophy cases over the summer. The Artist of the Month Club has had a facelift and will be continuing this school year, it is very popular amongst many of our students.

- Our Boogie-a-Thon will take place on October 31st. This will be our main fundraiser. The DJ has been booked, and the forms will be going home before the Thanksgiving weekend.
- Mrs. McLeod, who ran the school play last year, has left the school. Currently, we do not have a staff member willing to take on a school play. Alternatives are being looked at
- We have completed two of our 3 Fall fire drills. We will do a lockdown and bomb drill also over the next 8 weeks.
- We still do not have a CYC so we have consulted with and Itinerant CYC and are putting proactive programs in place including Go Girls, which offer three different programs throughout the school year to empower our preteen girls. We are also looking into a MindUp program for teachers interested in using this in their classrooms to help develop positive strategies to manage stress.
- We are partnering with the Public Health Nurse as a Family of Schools to look at other preventative actions we can take to support mental health and wellness in our students.
- Student nomination forms have gone out to our Intermediate students to once again organize a student government. This government will be responsible for our Safe School Action Team and foster Eco, Social Justice, and Equity and Inclusion Initiatives in the school.
