# YOUR CHILD'S RELIGIOUS DOCUMENTATION



In keeping with privacy legislation, HCDSB schools will no longer keep individual student documentation such as birth certificates, baptismal certificates, immigration status

papers, immunizations, etc. on file in a student's record. Once registration of a student is complete, any copies taken of these documents will be destroyed. As such, we ask that parents have ready access to their original documents (i.e. baptismal certificates, first communion certificates) which will be required by the church when your child undertakes the sacraments of First Communion (Grade 2) and Confirmation (Grade 7). **These can no longer be provided by** 

**These can no longer be provided by the school**. Please note that children who have not been baptized Catholic cannot receive these sacraments, even if one parent is Catholic.

### WHEN A CHILD IS ILL



With colder weather approaching and cold and flu season coming upon us, we respectfully remind you that a child who is not feeling well struggles to learn and participate fully in the school program. An ill child will feel more comfortable at home. Also, it is likely he or she could infect other children. We strongly encourage parents to keep sick children at home or make other care arrangements. # CURRICULUM CORNER Math Fun!

Critical thinking, problem solving, reasoning ability and the ability to communicate mathematically are essential skills. These processes are the

foundation of mathematics instruction in Ontario schools. (Doing Mathematics with your Child, Kindergarten to Grade 6: A Parent Guide, 2012).

You are an important partner in your child's mathematics education.

Below are some problem solving activities you can do with your child at home.

# K-2 Problem:

Involve your child in using numbers to solve problems and make everyday decisions. You might ask the following:

- 1. There are 18 kids on the bus. At the bus stop, more kids got on the bus. There were 25 kids on the bus altogether. How many kids got on the bus at the bus stop?
- 2. Beth has 74 crayons. She gave 25 crayons to Sarah. How many crayons does Beth have left?

More challenging situations might involve adding or subtracting larger numbers or situations in which your child has to add or subtract more than once to solve the problem.

### Gr 3-4 Problem:

Pinecraft Roger is facing a problem. He has 5 stacks of wood of different heights and needs them to be of equal heights. He can only move 1 or 2 blocks of wood at a time to accomplish his task. What is the fewest number of moves Pinecraft Roger would need to make to complete this task?

Challenge: What if Pinecraft Roger had to make four piles of five instead? How many moves would this take?

# Gr. 5-6 Problem:

Hassan's family paid \$80 for tickets to Wonderpark for 2 adults and 5 children.

- a) If children's tickets cost \$10 each, how much will Bob's family pay for 4 adults and 3 children?
- b) Large groups get a 10% discount on the total cost. If your amazing teacher, and all the children in the class visit

Wonderpark, what will be the cost?

### Gr 7-8 Problem:

Five identical balls are numbered 1 to 5 and then placed in a bag. The bag is shaken so the balls are mixed up. A player draws three of the balls from the bag and then determines the sum of the numbers on the balls. The player wins the game if the sum of the numbers on the balls is odd. Determine the probability that a player wins the game. Express your answer in fraction form.

# SPECIAL EDUCATION What is an IEP?

An IEP is an Individual Education **Plan.** IEP's are developed for students who have been placed in a special education program whether or not they meet the formal definition of "exceptional". The IEP provides a series of "educational targets" for a variety of children who may require accommodations, modifications and/or alternative programming. The IEP includes several important including features specific educational expectations and outlines the special education program and services that will be received by the student. The IEP must be developed in consultation with parents. Parental involvement in the IEP process is and collaborative. crucial Collaboration with parents and older students will help to ensure that the expectations are attainable. The IEP must be completed within 30 days after a student has been placed in a program and the Principal must ensure that the parent receives a copy. The IEP is a working document which is intended to be reviewed and updated as needed, with a minimum of once per term or semester.
