### Students with Special Needs and the Christmas Holidays

Christmas and winter break can be fun, busy, and exciting – and the excitement and change in routine can also be chaotic for many students, especially those with special needs.

As much as educators do their best to maintain structure for students, the excitement of the holidays, the many special events and activities, and the time off school can be overwhelming. The change in routine can take a child out of their comfort zone and be difficult to cope with.

Here are some tips to help parents, caregivers and educators get through these challenging times.

#### School Events

- Prepare your child in advance for changes in the typical school schedule and special events.
- ✓ If possible, have pictures or social stories about what your child can expect.
- Practice and rehearse what is going to happen, especially if your child will be part of a presentation.
- Talk to staff about how your child is going to participate; confirm that supports are in place to help them succeed.
- Plan for a quieter evening after the event, so your child has a chance to decompress.

Social interactions

- Use visuals to help your child understand what is going to happen
- Count down the days before school ends and then starts back up again. This makes your child aware that there will be a change in schedules.
- A daily calendar can be very helpful during the break, especially to help your child anticipate parties or family gatherings.
- ✓ Start adjusting back to you regular routine (bedtimes, naptimes, and the overall schedule) a few days before school starts back up in January, to facilitate a smoother transition.
- Consider hosting friends and family rather than visiting in a place that is unfamiliar to the child.

Holidays can be a wonderful and memorable time for children, and it is important that they feel included and excited about the experiences during this time. Hopefully some of these ideas will provide ways to create special memories for everyone.

### KINDERGAREN REGISTRATION FOR SEPTEMBER 2017

Advance registration for students new to Kindergarten will take place on Tuesday, January 24<sup>th</sup> and Wednesday, January 25<sup>th</sup>.

We encourage all parents of potential school age students to register at this time to ensure the best possible classroom organization for September.

Please Note: If your child is presently attending JK at St. Luke you do not need to register him/her for Senior Kindergarten.

To register for Junior Kindergarten children must be 4 years of age on or before December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2017. Please bring the following documentation with you when you come to register your child for this

program.

- Roman or Eastern Rite Catholic Baptismal Certificate (Child's or Parent's)
- Birth Certificate proof of age is required
- Immunization Record Before registration is finalized, a child will have completed the prescribed program of immunization for diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, chicken pox, mumps and rubella. Parent(s) must provide evidence their child's Immunization Record.
- Proof of address to verify that the child is being registered at their home school.

#### WHEN A CHILD IS ILL

With the approaching cold weather and flu season, we remind you that a child who is not feeling well is in no state to learn and participate fully in the school program. An ill child will feel more comfortable at home. Also, it is likely he or she could infect other children. We strongly encourage parents to keep sick children at home or make other care arrangements. Thank you for your

understanding and cooperation.

#### **INCLEMENT WEATHER**

The Halton Catholic District School Board provides procedures to follow in the event of inclement weather. For extreme cold and temperatures with or without a wind chill factor:

- A) warmer than -15 C, students may remain outside for all regular outside activities.
- B) between -15 C and -20 C, students may remain outside for no longer than 20 minute intervals at a time.
- C) colder than -20 C, students must remain inside.

### SCHOOL EMERGENCY CLOSURES

In the event of inclement weather, Student Transportation Halton (HSTS) determines Services whether to cancel school transportation. When the decision is made to cancel transportation, it is cancelled for the entire day. In Director consultation. the Education of the Halton Catholic School District Board and the Director of Education of the Halton District School Board determine whether to close schools. In most cases, these decisions communicated are beginning at 6:30 a.m. The decision to cancel buses and/or close schools is communicated the following ways:

### TOWN OF OAKVILLE CROSSING GUARDS NOTICE

The Town of Oakville has implemented a new inclement weather procedure for all Town of Oakville school crossing guards. The procedures outlined below define parameters for crossing guard duties when there is a weather alert or an extreme weather warning issued by the Environment Canada.

## Cold Alerts/Extreme Cold Warnings

If there is a cold alert, crossing guards will be on duty, but service

- may be interrupted or intermittent if travel becomes difficult and guards cannot make it to their crossing location.
- Environment Canada issues a cold alert when the daily predicted low is -15° C without wind chill

If there is an extreme cold warning of -30° C or colder, guards will not be on duty even if the schools remain open.

- Environment Canada issues an Extreme Cold Warning for outdoor activity (when the temperature or wind chill is expected to reach -30° C for at least two hours); or
- Extreme weather conditions such as blizzard or ice storm.

### TIS THE SEASON...FOR ITCHING!

It's that time of year again. When head lice tend to make their way into our school for a holiday visit.

#### Preventing Lice

Having head lice is not a sign of uncleanliness or poor hygiene.

However, you can help to prevent kids from getting lice — or from becoming

Re-infested with lice — by taking the following precautions:

- -Tell kids to try to avoid head-tohead contact at school (in gym, on the playground, or during sports) and while playing at home with other children.
- -Tell kids not to share combs, brushes, hats, scarves, bandanas, ribbons, barrettes, hair ties or bands, towels, helmets, or other personal care items with anyone else, whether they may have lice or not.
- -Tell kids not to lie on bedding, pillows, and carpets that have recently been used by someone with lice.
- -Every 3 or 4 days, examine members of your household who have had close contact with a person who has lice. Then, treat those who are found to have lice or nits close to the scalp.

#### Treatment

Your local pharmacist can recommend a medicated shampoo, cream rinse, or lotion to kill the lice. These may be over-the-counter (OTC) or prescription medications, depending on what treatments have already been tried. Medicated lice treatments usually kill the lice

and nits, but it may take a few days for the itching to stop.

A reminder to please call the school office if you have found your child to have lice or nits so that we can have the class checked. Children must be rechecked by WeCare before returning to school.
