PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE



During the month of March we continue our devotions of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving in this Holy season of Lent in

preparation for Easter. Our Ash Wednesday liturgy on March 1st with Fr. Con will mark the beginning of Lent, a time when we are asked to repent or "turn away" from sin and to come to know God more fully through his Son, Jesus Christ. Coming to know our God more intimately through our relationship with Jesus Christ and the people around us is the work of our lives. That work began at our Baptism when we went down into the waters with Christ and rose to new life with him. MORNING DROP OFF & SUPERVISION

Parents, we need your cooperation to ensure the safety of our students - your children - at St. Luke School. Once again, we ask that you please observe our safe driving and parking procedures (rain, snow or shine) in the school parking lot and driveways. Cars are not permitted to park or be left running in the Fire Lane in front of the school. This is a drop-off zone only. S.E.A.C. SOUNDBYTESRaising awareness of the Special Education process at HCDSB



As parents, we always worry about how our children with

special needs will be supported when we are not with them, and school is no different.

When our exceptional children enter the school system, we want to ensure that they have the best resources and tools available to help them maximize their learning opportunities and educational experience. The HCDSB places great emphasis on supporting all students, and this includes a dedicated focus on students with special needs. Students benefit from a team of educators focused on special education, including Special Education Resource Teachers, Special Education Itinerant teachers, Consultants. psychologists and social workers. speech pathologists, audiologists, educational assistants and many more professionals in addition to their classroom teacher. For those students who require it, specialized equipment and technology is made available. Examples may include FM Systems, computer hardware and software, seating systems, and writing aids. In cases where required, specialized transportation is also provided.

In the same way that some children require special resources and support, some children benefit from specialized learning environments, and as such there are different placements that are available for educators and families to consider. that best meet the needs of the student. There are options that range from placements where students remain in a regular classroom with supports withdrawal assistance to Special Education classrooms with full time or part time integration.

In order to determine what support resources or classroom placements would best benefit their child, meetings are scheduled with the school team and the student's parents or guardians to discuss and evaluate the needs of the student.

Parental input in this process is vital and the more information that can be shared with the school team, the better, so that they may be able to properly assess which resources would best meet the needs of the student. Once it has been decided what that student will require, a referral is sent in to request the applicable resources. In some cases, the local CCAC (Community Care Access Centres) will also be included in the discussion because they coordinate in school support for special education students in the areas of Physical and Occupational Therapy, and in some cases additional Speech Language Therapy.

GRADE 8 GRADUATION COMMITTEE VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Parents, guardians, family members of all grades and high school students requiring volunteer hours are invited to be part of the Graduation Committee. Assistance is needed in the following areas:

- Planning and organizing
- · Decorating the gym
- Taking down of decorations in the gym the day after graduation
- Graduation Reception—
 The reception is normally hosted by parents of students in grade 7, with the assistance of the grade 7 students. One or two parents are required to organize and coordinate this event. Time commitment: a few hours prior to Graduation Day and 3-4 hours the afternoon/evening of Graduation.
